

November – A Time to Remember our Veterans

Over 100 years ago, in 1918, at the 11th hour of the 11th day of the 11th month, the brutal hostilities of World War I were halted when an armistice was declared. The following year, President Woodrow Wilson declared November 11 as Armistice Day. The name was later changed to Veterans Day to include veterans from other conflicts. It is one of the few holidays that is celebrated on its actual date of November 11 instead of the nearest Monday. Rio Vista has been celebrating this day and its veterans throughout the years.





In addition to parades and speeches on Veterans Day itself, Rio Vista has memorialized its veterans in other ways. Walking around town, from the Sacramento River to St. Joseph's Church, we find evidence of this honor and remembrance.





The Rio Vista Museum has also always honored our local veterans. We have a wonderful display of uniforms and memorabilia in our back room. We also have several books by and about veterans. While we have one notable book for sale, *Starvation Days*, we have other books available for perusal and research in our back room reading nook.

Starvation Days

One of the many items the Rio Vista Museum has is the World War II prisoner of war diary of George Nelson. George was taken prisoner by the Japanese in May 1942. While he was a prisoner, George worked in mines. He kept a diary of his experience. Here are a few of the entries from George's diary.

OCTOBER 24: Worked with Troynoski and Toney and we put out 14 cars. Rations are getting smaller and smaller it seems. No more yeast tablets for beriberi. News concerning Hitler.

NOVEMBER 2: Worked with Jockoline and Hall and put out 24 cars. Came in around 9:30 p.m. and ate chow. Everyone has some kind of beriberi or other.

NOVEMBER 16: Legs and face all swelled up. More men turning in all the time. No medicine and food is more "scosh." Wonder what will happen? Still on quarters and never had wet beriberi before I got in this starvation camp. Eight stovepipe cigarettes for work and eight for commissary sale. Dr. Dublin diluted 4 cc Bevitin (B1) with sterile water and made total of 50 cc for 1-cc injection daily for approximately 50 days. Took first one today.

NOVEMBER 19: More men sick every day. Nothing is being done yet sick lined up this morning at 8:00 and 10:00 o'clock. Some volunteered for light duty. Rest the same so far.


NOVEMBER 28: Another birthday in prison and weighing lower than when I came in the Corps at 19. Weight about 64 kilos. I wonder how much longer? Open butter can – Army ration for birthday dinner. Still taking my own Bevitin. Swelling went down after first week. Squash and something else came in. Had small piece of meat for breakfast with gravy and Chinese cabbage side dish. ½ apple per man. (Butter and bread for birthday supper.) Sure was good.

DECEMBER 24: Christmas Eve. If only I was home, but I'll appreciate it when I do get there – like I never did before – I guess. Received sealed Red Cross Box No. 10 with tears in our eyes while "Silent Night" was played on accordion – also a few stateside records. About ½ bar soap issued per man. Ate bento ration at 10:00 p.m. with sweet spuds, butter, chili pepper and maize around barracks stove. Had severe case of cramps. Sweet spuds today and bread.

George Nelson's diary, entitled *Starvation Days – A Prisoner of War Diary*, is available at the Rio Vista Museum. The cost is \$16, tax included.
